

Even though he's only 12 years old, this summer Reggie Fields began his own business, Reggie's Lawn Cutting Service. Reggie hired his cousins and brothers and sisters to work for him. Business was going fine until the end of June when Reggie mistakenly crossed the property line of the yard he was hired to mow, and he mowed a strip of the neighbor's yard. The neighbor promptly called the police on the kids. The police, upon arrival, only talked to the adults and didn't even bother the workers. When Reggie realized the problem, he was afraid and discouraged, but he apologized and moved on. Word got out about what happened, and now Reggie's business is booming. Reggie is receiving 15 to 20 calls per week to mow people's yards, up from just 4 or 5 before the incident. Reggie's work wasn't perfect, but people appreciate his efforts and the way he responded to his mistake. They want to support and encourage his efforts.
